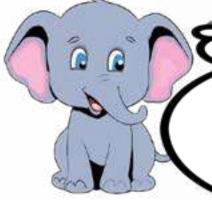

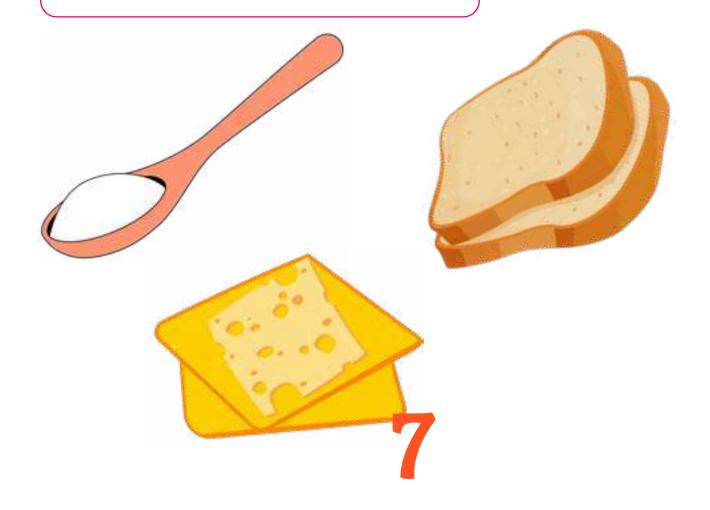
Grilled Cheese Sandwich.

Ingredients.

- 2. slices of bread
- 2. slices of cheese (cheddar, American, or

your choice)

1. tablespoon butter



Instructions.

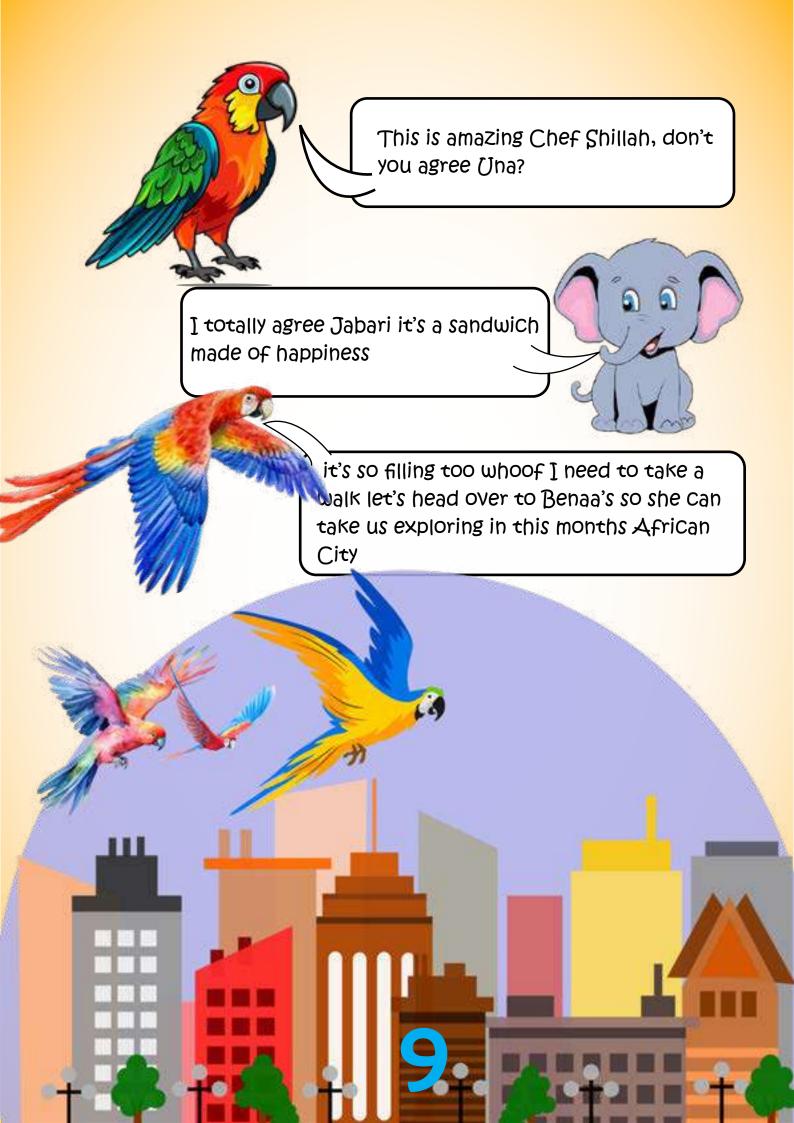
- 1. Heat a pan over medium heat.
- 2. Spread butter on one side of each slice of bread.
- 3. Place one slice of bread, butter side down, on the pan.
- 4. Put the cheese slices on top of the bread.
- 5. Top with the second slice of bread, butter side up.
- 6. Cook until the bottom slice is golden brown, about 2-3 minutes.
- 7. Flip the sandwich and cook until the other side is golden brown and the cheese is melted, another 2-3 minutes.

8. Remove the bread from the pan, let it cool a little bit, and then cut in half and serve.



You can serve the sandwich with milk, tea, juice or a smoothie.

Together, they chase the cat and shut other wormholes, leading to fun and action scenes. They even start to like each other.

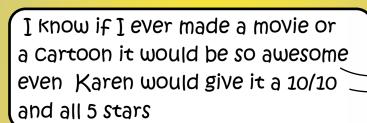

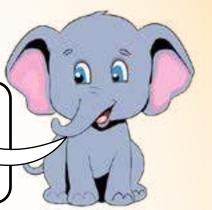
1. Did you know that in a family of elephants, the oldest female, Called the matriarch, is the leader? She guides the herd and knows where to find food and water!

3. Did you know that in some penguin species, the dad takes care of the egg? Emperor penguin dads keep the egg warm on their feet for two whole months until it hatches!

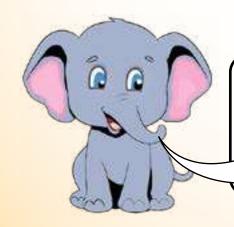

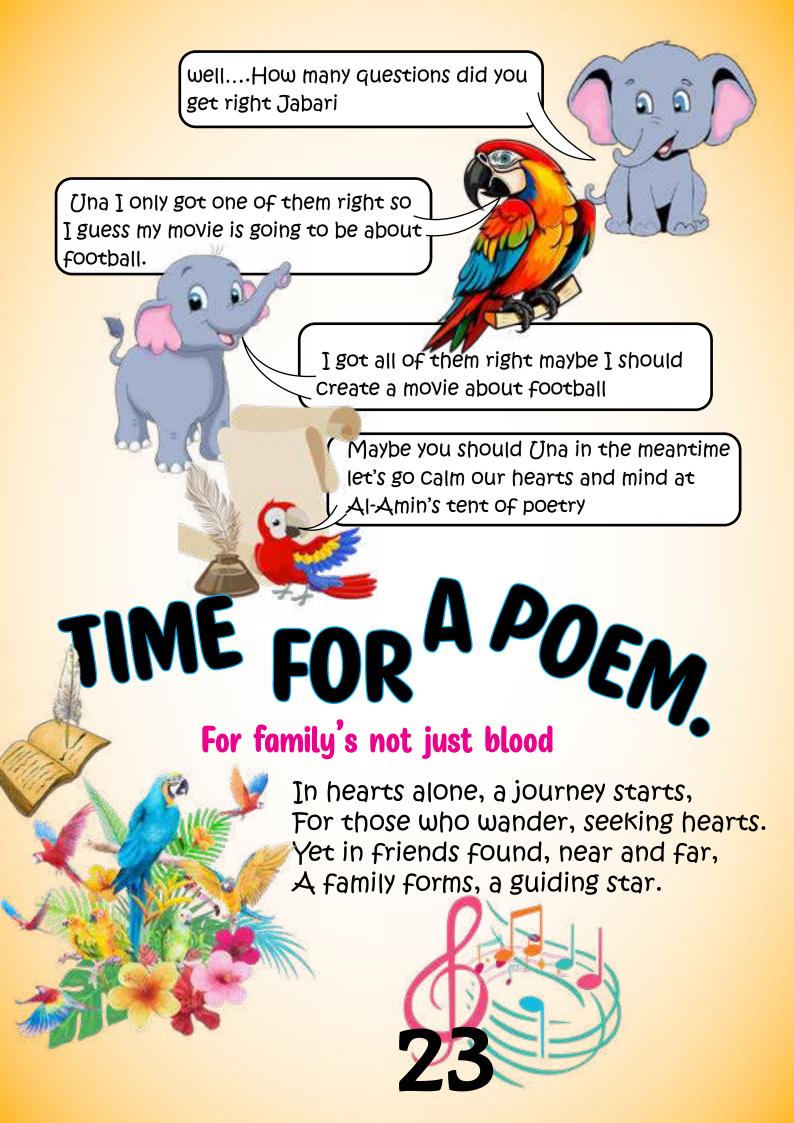

Remember, the healthiest habits are the ones that are fun and easy to do together.

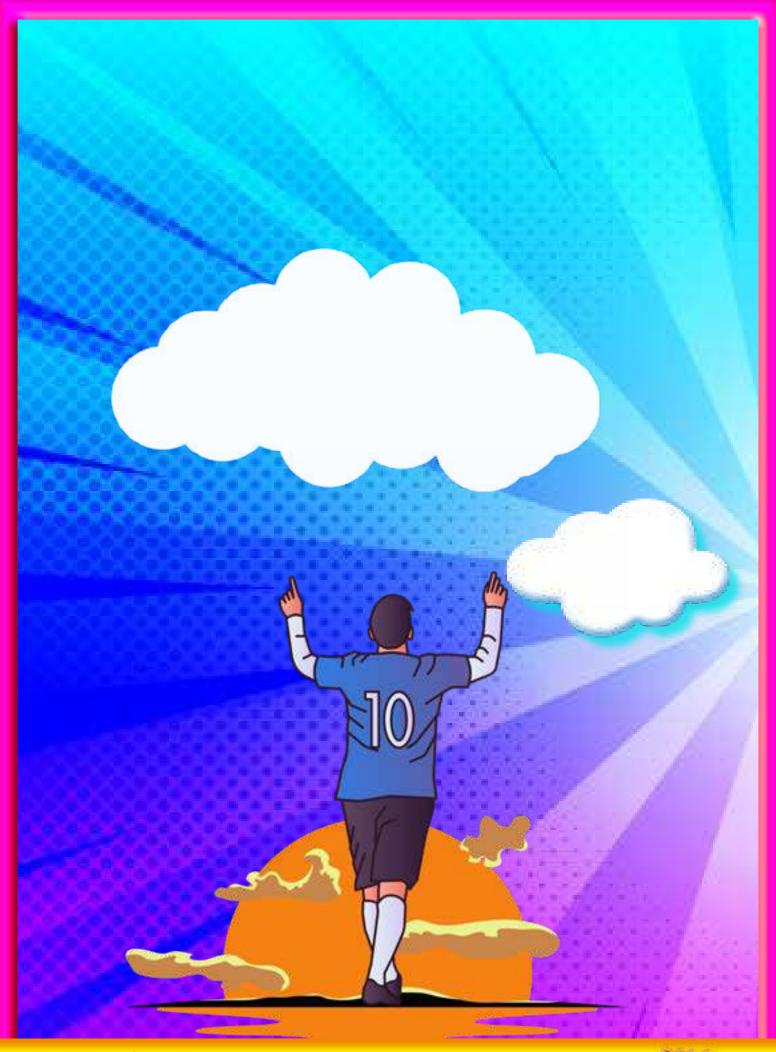
