Natural Wonders: From the Serengeti to the Nile River, Africa is full of breathtaking landscapes.



# DURBAR FESTIVAL NIGERIA

The Durbar Festival is a colorful celebration held in Northern Nigeria, particularly in cities like Kano and Katsina. This festival marks the end of the farming season and features grand processions of horsemen adorned in richly embroidered garments.

# UMHLANGA (REED DANCE) ESWATINI



The Umhlanga Reed Dance, celebrated in Eswatini (formerly Swaziland), is a vibrant tradition where thousands of young women gather to honor the Queen Mother. Dressed in colorful attire, the women perform intricate dances and present freshly cut reeds as a symbol of respect. The event is an important cultural ritual, showcasing dance, music, and unity, while promoting the values of chastity and community pride.





## TIMKAT ETHIOPIA

Timkat, meaning "baptism," is Ethiopia's version of the Epiphany Celebration. It is deeply rooted in Ethiopian culture, featuring processions where replicas of the Ark of the Covenant are paraded and blessed in rivers or pools. Although rooted in religious practices, it is also a time for traditional feasting, community dances, and the celebration of Ethiopian heritage.

## OUIDAH VOODOO FESTIVAL BENHA

In Benin, the Quidah Voodoo Festival Celebrates the nation's rich Voodoo heritage. This annual event features traditional dances, music and rituals to honor the spirits and ancestors. Participants wear brightly colored garments, and the festival is a vibrant display of the community's spiritual and cultural roots.

In Niger, the Garba Festival Celebrates the Wodaabe people's traditions, particularly their beauty contest for men. # FESPACO BURKINA FASO

The Pan-African Film and Television Festival of Ouagadougou (Fespaco) in Burkina Faso is a celebration of African storytelling through cinema. Filmmakers and artists from across the continent gather to share stories rooted in their communities.

# LAMU CULTURAL FESTIVAL KENYA

#### CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITES

EDUCATION FOR EVERYONE

In some parts of Africa, going to school is still a dream. Millions of kids don't have access to classrooms, books, or even proper meals.



In Mombasa, Kenya a start-up named Twende Green Ecocycle is tackling plastic pollution by transforming waste collected from beaches into school desks and chairs. This initiative not only addresses marine plastic waste but also provides sustainable and durable furniture for schools. The desks allow students to study more comfortably and are part of a larger mission to promote environmental conservation and education. Co-founder Lawrence Kosgei was inspired by his personal experience with inadequate school furniture, leading to this impactful project



# TO MAKE EDUCATION EASY TO GET.

In Nigeria, youth are using technology to improve education accessibility. For example, apps like ulesson provide video lessons and quizzes tailored to students, helping bridge gaps in rural areas. Similarly, Passing offers exam prep tools, and Scholarx connects students to scholarship opportunities.
